Reflection: Sunday 3rd August 2025

Seventh Sunday after Trinity

Those of us of a certain age who still remember rationing in the 1940's and 50's might recall Mother (or someone) serving a meal and saying "You will have what you're given, dear". What a contrast to the number of choices on offer to children today! Though we were spared choices, we can but hope that the modern way is a help to children in decision making.

Whether it is or not, we are all confronted by the need to make choices all the time. Jesus in the Gospel meets two brothers who find it difficult. Jesus doesn't solve their problem for them, but he goes to the heart of the matter by showing the importance of having good guiding principles, such as overcoming greed and showing concern for others. The prosperous farmer in the same passage has no problem in deciding what to do with his bumper harvest, but his guiding principle of blatant selfishness leads only to catastrophe.

The Teacher in the Old Testament passage, on the other hand, sees all life as futile and can see no point in choosing to do anything worthwhile – especially work or getting money, as that just means feathering the nests of other people. But even so, a decision to regard everything as worthless is a choice in itself.

Paul writes to the people at Colossae about 100 miles east of Ephesus in Asia Minor, to challenge them all to see that the making of choices should be determined by a rebirth into a new way of living. Through Baptism, we are a new creation. We are to fix our attention on Jesus and try to think as he thought and make up our minds to act as he acted. In the great racial mix of men and women that made up the Hellenistic culture of Paul's world, it is the image of Christ, the man for all people, which they should hold in their hearts and minds. So should we as we choose our path through life.

Ecclesiastes 1.2, 12-14, 2.18-23

1.2 Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher,
vanity of vanities! All is vanity.

12 I, the Teacher, when king over Israel in Jerusalem,
13 applied my mind to seek and to search out by
wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy
business that God has given to human beings to be busy
with.

14 I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun; and
see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind.

2.18 I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the
sun, seeing that I must leave it to those who come after
me

19 -and who knows whether they will be wise or
foolish? Yet they will be master of all for which I toiled
and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity.

20 So I turned and gave my heart up to despair
concerning all the toil of my labours under the sun,
21 because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom
and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by
another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a
great evil.

22 What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with
which they toil under the sun?

23 For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a
vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also
is vanity.

Colossians 3.1-11

1 So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things
that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand
of God.

2 Set your minds on things that are above, not on things
that are on earth,

3 for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in
God.

4 When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also
will be revealed with him in glory.

5 Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly:
fornication, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed
(which is idolatry).

6 On account of these the wrath of God is coming on
those who are disobedient.

7 These are the ways you also once followed, when you
were living that life.

8 But now you must get rid of all such things-anger,
wrath, malice, slander, and abusive language from your
mouth.

9 Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have
stripped off the old self with its practices

10 and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which
is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of
its creator.

11 In that renewal there is no longer Greek and Jew,
circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian,
slave and free; but Christ is all and in all!

Luke 12.13-21

13 Someone in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, tell my
brother to divide the family inheritance with me.'

14 But he said to him, 'Friend, who set me to be a judge
or arbitrator over you?'

15 And he said to them, 'Take care! Be on your guard
against all kinds of greed; for one's life does not consist
in the abundance of possessions.'

16 Then he told them a parable: 'The land of a rich man
produced abundantly.

17 And he thought to himself, "What should I do, for I
have no place to store my crops?"

18 Then he said, "I will do this: I will pull down my barns
and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain
and my goods.

19 And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods
laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry."

20 But God said to him, "You fool! This very night your
life is being demanded of you. And the things you have
prepared, whose will they be?"

21 So it is with those who store up treasures for
themselves but are not rich towards God.'

Food Bank Appeal:

Our Churches continue to support local Foodbanks. **Jubilee Foodbank Market Harborough** You can drop off donations at **Hallaton Church** or to Linda Jones at **25, Eastgate, Hallaton at any time**. Please note that all food collected is non-perishable, long-life or tinned.

The Foodbank has **MOST URGENT NEED of:**

Hot dogs, Jam, Meatballs, Peanut butter, Custard, Red meat: mince, stew, Bolognese, chilli, Pasta sauce, Tinned fruit, Chicken in sauce, Tinned carrots, UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed), microwave puddings, Sugar (500g)

They also need:

Meals that do not need cooking e.g. John West Fish and rice meals, Biscuits, Tinned vegetarian meals e.g. veggie chilli, Sweets, snacks, crisps and cereal bars, Orange squash, Fruit juice, Dried potatoes (Smash), Crackers, Tinned sweetcorn, Tinned tomatoes, Tinned peas, Tinned ham, Fray Bentos pies, Sandwich paste, Teabags, Cup of Soup, Tinned potatoes, Sugar (500g), Cup of soup, ALPRO yoghurts (long-life, for the shelf not fridge), Long-life meals, Robinsons minis or similar for families (small squash concentrates), Small cartons of long life milk (for homeless people or someone without a fridge)

Cathedral Civic Service to Mark the 80th Anniversary of VJ Day



A special reflective service will take place at Leicester Cathedral at 5.30pm on Thursday 14th August to mark the 80th anniversary of VJ (Victory over Japan) and the end of the Second World War

Held on the eve of the anniversary, the service will offer space for remembrance and reflection on the end of the Second World War, which came just days after the

devastating atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Members of the public are invited to attend the service, which invites people to pause and consider the ongoing instability of the world, the continued proliferation of nuclear weapons, and the deep and enduring need for peace.

Lord-Lieutenant of Leicestershire, Mike Kapur OBE CstJ, said: "Marking the 80th anniversary of VJ Day gives us an opportunity to reflect not only on the end of one of the darkest chapters in our history, but also on the sacrifices made by so many, including those from Leicester and Leicestershire. It is vital that we remember the past in order to build a more peaceful future."

The service will include prayers, readings and moments of silence, offering a quiet and powerful tribute to those affected by the war and its aftermath.

STOMP Round Leicester

Leicester Cathedral is one of many city centre locations hosting magnificent elephant sculptures as part of the STOMP Round Leicester art trail, raising vital funds for LOROS Hospice and marking its 40th anniversary.

Forty gentle giants have journeyed into Leicester's streets, parks and open spaces, forming a jumbo trail across the city **until Sunday 21 September.**

The Cathedral is home to a mini-herd of baby elephant sculptures, adopted and decorated by local schools and community groups.

When the trail ends, the baby elephants will stomp back to join their owners, while the giant elephant sculptures will be auctioned on Wednesday 8 October to raise money for the hospice, which helps terminally ill local people and their families at the most difficult times of their lives.
