Reflection for Sunday 30th June 2024 Fifth Sunday After Trinity

Today's Gospel reading tells of the restoration to life of Jairus' daughter. However, sandwiched within that account is another healing, another restoring to life, that of the woman who had suffered bleeding for twelve years.

We know little about her but may perhaps look at certain aspects. She may well be a widow, therefore without the resources of family and what she did have, she would have spent on doctors, probably with no effect. In the culture of the day, her affliction meant that she would have been considered 'unclean' and therefore shunned and avoided. She would certainly have been aware of the stigma, so she is seen to keep a low profile, wounded in body, mind and spirit. Yet she longs for wholeness. Having heard of Jesus, she retains one desperate hope. If she can only touch Jesus' cloak, she will be healed. Could that be seen as a tiny mustard seed of faith? Once she touches Jesus' cloak, she is indeed healed. But Jesus is fully aware of what has happened – yes, even to an obscure individual - as he is surrounded by a crowd of folk.

This is a bodily healing. But Jesus calls her out. She is asked to confirm her healing, to witness publicly to what He has done for her. As she does so, her healing is confirmed, and in Jesus' own words', she is freed from her suffering, restored not just in body, but also to the fulness of social life.

Similarly, in our crowded lives, we brush against the wounded as they carry unseen burdens but are unwilling to draw attention to their needs, often perceived as weaknesses by others. So we might ask the question, do they hope for release?

We are the body of Christ in the world and, as Teresa of

Avile wrote, if we are 'his eyes, his hands, his feet by which he blesses the world', then in the power of his Spirit, may we be sensitive to those in our crowd. An awareness. A touch. A smile. These may be the seed of blessing, suggesting the possibility of something new. **Revd John Taylor**

7 Now as you excel in everything-in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for youso we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking.

8 I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others.

9 For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich.

10 And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something-

11 now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means.12 For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has-not according to what one does not have.

13 I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between

14 your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance.

15 As it is written, 'The one who had much did not have too much,

and the one who had little did not have too little.' 16 But thanks be to God who put in the heart of Titus the same eagerness for you that I myself have.

17 For he not only accepted our appeal, but since he is more eager than ever, he is going to you of his own accord.

18 With him we are sending the brother who is famous among all the churches for his proclaiming of the good news;

19 and not only that, but he has also been appointed by the churches to travel with us while we are

administering this generous undertaking for the glory of the Lord himself and to show our goodwill.

20 We intend that no one should blame us about this generous gift that we are administering,

21 for we intend to do what is right not only in the Lord's sight but also in the sight of others.

22 And with them we are sending our brother whom we have often tested and found eager in many matters, but who is now more eager than ever because of his great confidence in you.

23 As for Titus, he is my partner and co-worker in your service; as for our brothers, they are messengers of the churches, the glory of Christ.

24 Therefore, openly before the churches, show them the proof of your love and of our reason for boasting about you.

Lamentations 3.23-33

23 they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

24 'The Lord is my portion,' says my soul, 'therefore I will hope in him.'

Draft Diocesan Strategy Presented to Leaders From Across the Diocese

Following a discernment morning in January, members of Diocesan Synod, Diocesan Trustees, Bishop's Children and Youth Council, Bishop's Council, Area Deans, Lay Chairs and the Bishop's Leadership Team met on Wednesday 19 June to review the draft diocesan strategy, in advance of it

coming to Diocesan Synod in September.

The feedback from previous gatherings, together with the findings from the diocese-wide consultations of recent years, have been carefully analysed and brought together to develop this ten-year strategy.

The draft strategy continues to emphasise our vision – the Kingdom of God; the Three Key Questions; and our five Strategic Priorities (Intercultural Communities, Eco-Communities, Reconciling Communities, New Communities and Intergenerational Communities) but it lays out more clearly how we will work towards these priorities and respond to societal shifts, our financial deficit and the assorted challenges which our worshipping communities face. This involves outlining plans for vocations and leadership, safeguarding, finance, church buildings, diocesan support and governance, and Minster Communities, as these form the foundations for our mission and ministry.

The day included worship and an address from Bishop Martyn, in which he expressed the continued importance of local empowerment, discipleship and work with children and young people.

Those present were invited to share their feedback on each aspect of the draft strategy and what else might need to be considered. Diocesan Synod will then discuss and vote on the strategy (which will be made available on our website) when it meets on 3 September. Read the full story:
