## **Reflection: Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2025** Third Sunday of Lent

#### Luke 13:1-9

The two stories and a parable set for our gospel reading this Sunday are all about repentance, while at the same time challenging a notion that was prevalent in the thoughts of Jewish people at those times, and still lurking in human thought today, that if bad things happen to you it must be because you were an evil person. So, the first story told to Jesus by some in the crowd is the murder by Pontius Pilate of some Galilean pilgrims in Jerusalem. We are not told the circumstances of this judicial murder only that it happened, but we know that this type of act was completely within Pilate's character. Jesus rejects the notion that their deaths were due to their sinfulness and strengthens his argument by referring to another contemporary tragedy of that time, the collapse of a tower in Jerusalem, which killed 18 people. In both cases he refutes sinfulness as the cause of the tragedies but warns his listeners that they too will perish if they do not respond to his gospel. To conclude his point, he then tells the parable of the fig tree. The fig tree was a symbol of Jewish Nationhood, so the choice of that tree was not an accident, and the overall message of the parable was clear. The whole nation of Israel would be given one more chance to flourish by God by accepting Jesus, with the implication being that if they again failed to bear the fruit of righteousness through faith in Jesus, then they would be supplanted and others including gentiles would be planted there instead, who would through faith bear the fruit of righteousness. A sobering thought as we reflect on our own lives during lent.

## Bible Readings: Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2025 Third Sunday of Lent

#### Isaiah 55.1-9

1 Ho, everyone who thirsts,

come to the waters; and you that have no money, come, buy and eat! Come, buy wine and milk without money and without price.

2 Why do you spend your money for that which is not bread,

and your labour for that which does not satisfy? Listen carefully to me, and eat what is good,

and delight yourselves in rich food.

3 Incline your ear, and come to me;

listen, so that you may live. I will make with you an everlasting covenant,

my steadfast, sure love for David.

4 See, I made him a witness to the peoples, a leader and commander for the peoples.

5 See, you shall call nations that you do not know, and nations that do not know you shall run to you,

because of the Lord your God, the Holy One of Israel, for he has glorified you.

6 Seek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near;

7 let the wicked forsake their way,

and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them,

and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon.

- 8 For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord.
- 9 For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.

#### 1 Corinthians 10.1-13

1 I do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud, and all passed through the sea,

2 and all were baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea,

3 and all ate the same spiritual food,

4 and all drank the same spiritual drink. For they drank from the spiritual rock that followed them, and the rock was Christ.

5 Nevertheless, God was not pleased with most of them, and they were struck down in the wilderness.6 Now these things occurred as examples for us, so that we might not desire evil as they did.

7 Do not become idolaters as some of them did; as it is written, 'The people sat down to eat and drink, and they rose up to play.'

8 We must not indulge in sexual immorality as some of them did, and twenty-three thousand fell in a single day.9 We must not put Christ to the test, as some of them did, and were destroyed by serpents.

10 And do not complain as some of them did, and were destroyed by the destroyer.

11 These things happened to them to serve as an example, and they were written down to instruct us, on whom the ends of the ages have come.

12 So if you think you are standing, watch out that you do not fall.

13 No testing has overtaken you that is not common to everyone. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tested beyond your strength, but with the testing he will also provide the way out so that you may be able to endure it.

#### Luke 13.1-9

1 At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices.

2 He asked them, 'Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans?

3 No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did.

4 Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them-do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem?

5 No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did.'

6 Then he told this parable: 'A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none.

7 So he said to the gardener, "See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?"

8 He replied, "Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig round it and put manure on it.

9 If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down.""

## Christian Aid News – Unstoppable Hope amidst Aid

By Pete Moorey Last month the UK government cut the Aid budget – a decision that, along with the decimation of US aid, is having a devastating impact on the world's poorest countries: from people in refugee camps whose food parcels will shrink to children awaiting life-saving vaccines. The support of churches is now more important than ever as Christian Aid is uniquely placed to bring hope and make a real difference by working through local partners.

We witnessed this unstoppable power of hope recently through a partner in Gaza, who formed a group called *Let's Create a Life* to give children respite from the trauma of war. Support from churches like yours allows this group to provide fun learning activities for displaced children. Abdullah from *Let's Create a Life* told Christian Aid: "In the children's ward of a hospital, there was a child who wouldn't engage with the doctors and was always depressed. I came dressed as a clown doctor, and we started playing and laughing with the kids. The doctors said it was the first time they'd seen that child laugh. That's what life is about. In *Let's Create a Life*, we can shape the lives we want, despite the pain and wounds, the losses we've experienced."

# NEW: Sacred Stories: Retelling the History of Horninghold



## St Peter's Church in Horninghold was recently awarded a grant of £174,926 from the National Lottery Heritage Fund (NHLF), to address repairs, make the building more accessible, and celebrate its history

The project began in response to urgent repairs beyond the means of the small village community, but it became clear there were greater possibilities for St Peter's, as PCC member Mary Twidell explains:

"Through making the application for the NLHF grant we became aware of, and excited by, the opportunities this could give to tell the story of the history of our church and village," she says

"It is very humbling and inspiring when you walk along the path to the church and pray within it to realise that for over eight centuries people have come here and offered prayers of joy and sorrow. We want this to continue over the next centuries.

"From the very start we have offered prayers for the task before us and we saw the answer to our prayers with the success of the NLHF grant and other grants that, together with the years of fundraising within our community, are making the project possible. It is our hope that by encouraging others to engage with the heritage and come into the church they will experience a sense of a welcoming Christian community." **Read the full story:**

## Stations of the Cross at Leicester Cathedral

## Exhibition: Stations of the Cross until 21st April

The Stations of the Cross are an ever-evolving form of devotion and contemplation in the Christian tradition. They form a narration of the final hours of the life of Jesus Christ on earth. Originating in Jerusalem, as Pilgrims arrived wanting to follow Jesus' journey, the practice was brought home to those unable to visit the Holy Land.

Different Christian traditions have included different stations; scriptural, imaginative or educational, all designed to bring us closer to the person of Jesus, the path he trod, the effect this wrought on those closest to him and on those he encountered for the first/only time.

Artist Mark Cazalet has painted images on Bread boards (Jesus being the Bread of Life), in dialogue with devotional poems and prompts from Richard Leaf, for pilgrims treading the path themselves. We invite you to follow the journey here at Leicester Cathedral and explore The Stations of the Cross for yourself. *The stations of the cross can be seen with free admission during the Cathedral's opening hours.*

## The Bishop's Lent appeal 2025 – The Leprosy Mission

## The Bishops' Lent Appeal for 2025 is in support of The Leprosy Mission, a Christian charity who work to provide healing and hope to those affected by leprosy.

Every two minutes, someone is diagnosed with leprosy. Although it is curable, millions of people worldwide are living with the effects of the disease, from physical disability to mental health problems, poverty and discrimination. Caring for those with leprosy is a cause close to the heart of the Bishop of Loughborough, Rt Revd Saju Muthalaly, and a cause which has historical roots in Leicestershire.

Bishop Saju recently visited the village of Burton Lazars and the site of what was an historic administrative centre for the care of leprosy across the nation. He also stopped by St James' Church, which is home to 'Roger', a carved stone leper head, and one of just a few preserved relics from this time.

Here, he was taken back to his days growing up in a leprosy hospital in Bengaluru where his mother served as a nurse and, in this video, speaks about that time and the plight of The Leprosy Mission in Sri Lanka today.
