Reflection: Sunday 6th April 2025

Fifth Sunday of Lent

A person we love dearly dies. People come to share our grief. We have to tell them how the suffering began; what happened last month, last week, the other day and at the end. It's how we cope with grief.

That is what Passiontide is about, a period which begins this Sunday and takes us to Easter Day. For Jesus is the friend we love dearly, and all the events that led up to his suffering and cruel death are remembered and re-lived by us his committed followers.

St. John's account of those last days of Jesus' life can be so real to us. Jesus hears that Lazarus is ill. He comes up to Bethany, but too late to save the sick man, yet in his anguish he is able to restore Lazarus to life. He then has to run away to hide because the warrant is out for his arrest and it is too early to enter Jerusalem, but six days before the Passover, he comes back and takes part in the dinner at which Mary extravagantly pours scent over his feet, to the annoyance of Judas.

Next day it is time to enter the city with all the other pilgrims, time enough before Passover to complete the ritual washing for purification. Peter is with him. At the last Supper, when Peter tells Jesus to wash him all over, Jesus says that Peter has done his bathing – only his feet need to be washed.

St. Paul knows all about ritual washing. He's done it for years, but all that dutiful routine of being a faithful Pharisee are swept away in his mind by the new experience of knowing Jesus as his friend and Saviour.

Paul knows too what suffering is about and his friendship with Jesus enables him to enter into the things that Jesus suffered.

Mary at Bethany enters into Jesus' suffering in a way that Judas Iscariot, tragically dominated by his own agenda, was not able to do. And we? Are we so dominated by own agenda that unthinkingly we let Passiontide pass us by? Or are we able specially at this time able to remember all that happened to our Friend and Saviour and share his grief?

Philippians 3.4b-14

4 even though I, too, have reason for confidence in the
flesh. If anyone else has reason to be confident in the
flesh, I have more:

5 circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the
people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born
of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee;

6 as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to
righteousness under the law, blameless.

7 Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard
as loss because of Christ.

8 More than that, I regard everything as loss because of
the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord.

For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I
regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ

9 and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my
own that comes from the law, but one that comes
through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God
based on faith.

10 I want to know Christ and the power of his
resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by
becoming like him in his death,

11 if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the
dead.

12 Not that I have already obtained this or have already
reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own,
because Christ Jesus has made me his own.

13 Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my
own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind
and straining forward to what lies ahead,

14 I press on towards the goal for the prize of the
heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

John 12.1-8

1 Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead.

2 There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him.

3 Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume.

4 But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said,

5 'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?'

6 (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.)

7 Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial.

8 You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

Bishop Martyn Speaks Out On Child Poverty and Welfare Reform



With the debate continuing on government welfare reform, senior faith leaders from across the country have joined forces in an urgent call for the government to go further and be 'bold and ambitious' in its forthcoming Child Poverty Strategy

Bishop Martyn, who serves as the lead bishop in the Church of England for welfare, has joined the call and put his name to an open letter to the co-chairs of the Ministerial Child Poverty Taskforce, Bridget Philipson, Secretary of State for Education, and Liz Kendall, Secretary of State for Work and Pensions.

The letter is signed by 35 faith leaders from all six of the major faith traditions represented in the UK.

Following the government's recent welfare reform announcements, the Bishop of Leicester, along with the Archbishop of York, and Canon Alice Kemp, have each expressed their views on the impact of the proposals

Bishop Martyn shared his understanding of the deep concern felt by those whose vital income could be at risk. While he acknowledged the difficult choices the government faces, he

expressed concern that the burden of these decisions should not fall on those already struggling, highlighting the disproportionate effect on disabled people, who are already battling poverty. **You can read the full story here:**

Stations of the Cross at Leicester Cathedral

Exhibition: Stations of the Cross until 21st April

The Stations of the Cross are an ever-evolving form of devotion and contemplation in the Christian tradition. They form a narration of the final hours of the life of Jesus Christ on earth. Originating in Jerusalem, as Pilgrims arrived wanting to follow Jesus' journey, the practice was brought home to those unable to visit the Holy Land.

Different Christian traditions have included different stations; scriptural, imaginative or educational, all designed to bring us closer to the person of Jesus, the path he trod, the effect this wrought on those closest to him and on those he encountered for the first/only time.

Artist Mark Cazalet has painted images on Bread boards (Jesus being the Bread of Life), in dialogue with devotional poems and prompts from Richard Leaf, for pilgrims treading the path themselves. We invite you to follow the journey here at Leicester Cathedral and explore The Stations of the Cross for yourself. **The stations of the cross can be seen with free admission during the Cathedral's opening hours.**

The Bishop's Lent appeal 2025 – The Leprosy Mission

The Bishops' Lent Appeal for 2025 is in support of The Leprosy Mission, a Christian charity who work to provide healing and hope to those affected by leprosy.

Every two minutes, someone is diagnosed with leprosy. Although it is curable, millions of people worldwide are living with the effects of the disease, from physical disability to mental health problems, poverty and discrimination.

Caring for those with leprosy is a cause close to the heart of the Bishop of Loughborough, Rt Revd Saju Muthalaly, and a cause which has historical roots in Leicestershire.

Bishop Saju recently visited the village of Burton Lazars and the site of what was an historic administrative centre for the care of leprosy across the nation.

He also stopped by St James' Church, which is home to 'Roger', a carved stone leper head, and one of just a few preserved relics from this time.

Here, he was taken back to his days growing up in a leprosy hospital in Bengaluru where his mother served as a nurse and, in this video, speaks about that time and the plight of The Leprosy Mission in Sri Lanka today.
