Reflection: Sunday 17th August 2025

Nineth Sunday after Trinity

We sometimes think of faith as being a quiet activity, but in this week's passage from Hebrews faith looks far more active. Walking into the Red Sea when the water hasn't yet parted takes courage!

We hear of men and women who risked, endured, fought, wandered, suffered and died because of their faith in God's promises, even when they didn't live to see the outcome.

Their stories are inspiring, but they also challenge us: can we hold on to faith as they did, through thick and thin? Can we still follow Jesus in hard times?

These stories also remind us that we are not the first to walk this road. Their faith shows that God is faithful, even when times are hard. Not only that, they're a cheering crowd, urging us to hold the faith until we too reach our finishing line.

Then the writer turns to Jesus; for his audience, a man of their times. Jesus, the man who ran ahead and endured the cross, not because it was easy but because of the joy beyond it. His race was full of shame, suffering, and rejection and yet he kept running. Why? Because Jesus knew the prize - his place with the Father and the Holy Spirit in the kingdom of God.

This knowledge changes how we face our own race. Our Christian life isn't just about surviving, it's about running with a purpose, casting off the unholy habits that slow us down, and keeping our eyes fixed on Christ.

When times are hard, let this passage remind us: We're not alone. We're not forgotten. And we're not running in vain. There's a crowd cheering us on and our Saviour is waiting at the line.

So let's fix our eyes, not on our failures, not on our pain, not on the world, but on Jesus.

And keep running!

Nineth Sunday after Trinity

Jeremiah 23.23-29

23 Am I a God near by, says the Lord, and not a God far off?

24 Who can hide in secret places so that I cannot see them? says the Lord. Do I not fill heaven and earth? says the Lord.

25 I have heard what the prophets have said who prophesy lies in my name, saying, 'I have dreamed, I have dreamed!'

26 How long? Will the hearts of the prophets ever turn back-those who prophesy lies, and who prophesy the deceit of their own heart?

27 They plan to make my people forget my name by their dreams that they tell one another, just as their ancestors forgot my name for Baal.

28 Let the prophet who has a dream tell the dream, but let the one who has my word speak my word faithfully. What has straw in common with wheat? says the Lord.

29 Is not my word like fire, says the Lord, and like a hammer that breaks a rock in pieces?

Hebrews 11.29-12.2

29 By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as if it were dry land, but when the Egyptians attempted to do so they were drowned.

30 By faith the walls of Jericho fell after they had been encircled for seven days.

31 By faith Rahab the prostitute did not perish with those who were disobedient, because she had received the spies in peace.

32 And what more should I say? For time would fail me to tell of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets-

33 who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, obtained promises, shut the mouths of lions,

34 quenched raging fire, escaped the edge of the sword, won strength out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight.

35 Women received their dead by resurrection. Others were tortured, refusing to accept release, in order to obtain a better resurrection.

36 Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment.

37 They were stoned to death, they were sawn in two, they were killed by the sword; they went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, persecuted, tormented-
38 of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, and in caves and holes in the ground.

39 Yet all these, though they were commended for their faith, did not receive what was promised,

40 since God had provided something better so that they would not, without us, be made perfect.

12 Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us,

2 looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God.

Luke 12.49-56

49 'I came to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled!

50 I have a baptism with which to be baptized, and what stress I am under until it is completed!

51 Do you think that I have come to bring peace to the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division!

52 From now on, five in one household will be divided, three against two and two against three;

53 they will be divided: father against son

and son against father, mother against daughter

and daughter against mother, mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law

and daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.'

54 He also said to the crowds, 'When you see a cloud rising in the west, you immediately say, "It is going to rain"; and so it happens.

55 And when you see the south wind blowing, you say, "There will be scorching heat"; and it happens.

56 You hypocrites! You know how to interpret the appearance of earth and sky, but why do you not know how to interpret the present time?

Food Bank Appeal:

Our Churches continue to support local Foodbanks. **Jubilee Foodbank Market Harborough** You can drop off donations at **Hallaton Church** or to Linda Jones at **25, Eastgate, Hallaton at any time**. Please note that all food collected is non-perishable, long-life or tinned.

The Foodbank has **MOST URGENT NEED of:**

Microwave rice, Corned beef, Tinned peas, Tinned ham, Tinned rice pudding, Tinned vegetarian meals, such as veggie chilli, Marmalade.

They also need:

Meals that do not need cooking e.g. John West Fish and rice meals, Biscuits, Snacks and cereal bars, Coffee (small jars), Custard, Fruit squash/ juice, Hot dogs (tins or jars), Red meat: mince, stew, Bolognese, chilli, Pasta sauce, Microwave puddings, Pasta sauce, Peanut butter, Chicken in sauce, UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed), Tinned carrots, Tinned pasta, Dried potatoes (Smash), Crackers, Tinned sweetcorn, Tinned tomatoes, Fray Bentos pies, Sandwich paste, Teabags, Cup of Soup, Tinned potatoes, Tuna, Sugar (500g), Cup of soup, ALPRO yoghurts (long-life, for the shelf not fridge), Long-life meals, Robinsons minis or similar for families (small squash concentrates), Small cartons of long life milk (for homeless people or someone without a fridge)

Generosity Week is a celebration of God's generosity that is lived out in our churches and parishes. It gives us an opportunity to engage with and support the wider community as we celebrate the generosity found. This isn't a celebration of

'our' generosity but God's, which is found within the church and outside it.

To start planning and promoting Generosity Week, take these three steps:

1. Pick a week – the national week runs from Sunday 28 September to Sunday 5 October but if another time works better for you, do it then.
 2. Choose what to do – think what your church needs and look through the resources available (see below).
 3. Plan your Sundays – two Sundays works well as it gives you one chance to explore gratitude and one to consider generosity. To get you started, there are service outlines, sermon starters and prayers – all generosity themed.

Mental Health First Aid Training
