Reflection for Sunday 28th April 2024 Fifth Sunday of Easter

The image of Jesus as the True Vine and his people as the branches is a very powerful one, with several layers of meaning. It is Jesus himself who supports and nourishes us and the sap is his life flowing through us. If we are open to it, we can grow and bear fruit and show his love in our lives, in our words and in our actions. If we are not then, whilst we may be physically alive, we are spiritually dead.

The Vine is a very egalitarian image and our only function is to bear fruit, not like Paul's understanding of the Body of Christ in which we all have a different part to play in making it work as a whole. It is not hierarchical; it is corporate. The word 'you' is plural throughout and there is no room for any cult of personality.

However, each branch is shaped by God and its growth is not left unchecked. In our own interests, and that of the vine as a whole, we are tended in a way that is both good for us and the Christian community. That does mean that we have to be pruned in order to be fruitful. Pruning is not an idea we relish and must inevitably be uncomfortable as the unfruitful parts of our life have to be stripped away, however much we may wish to cling on to them.

The pruning knife in this instance is the Word of God. It is by a study of the scriptures that we are enabled to shed the things that separate us from God and from one another. It is by prayer informed by the Word that we can indeed abide in Christ and he in us, assured of his unending love for us now and always.

Bible Readings: Sunday 28th April 2024 Fifth Sunday of Easter

Acts 8.26-end

New Revised Standard Version, Anglicised

26 Then an angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Get up and go towards the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' (This is a wilderness road.)

27 So he got up and went. Now there was an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of the Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, in charge of her entire treasury. He had come to Jerusalem to worship

28 and was returning home; seated in his chariot, he was reading the prophet Isaiah.

29 Then the Spirit said to Philip, 'Go over to this chariot and join it.'

30 So Philip ran up to it and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah. He asked, 'Do you understand what you are reading?'

31 He replied, 'How can I, unless someone guides me?' And he invited Philip to get in and sit beside him.

32 Now the passage of the scripture that he was reading was this: 'Like a sheep he was led to the slaughter, and like a lamb silent before its shearer,

so he does not open his mouth.

33 In his humiliation justice was denied him.

Who can describe his generation?

For his life is taken away from the earth.'

34 The eunuch asked Philip, 'About whom, may I ask you, does the prophet say this, about himself or about someone else?'

35 Then Philip began to speak, and starting with this scripture, he proclaimed to him the good news about Jesus.

36 As they were going along the road, they came to some water; and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water! What is to prevent me from being baptized?'

38 He commanded the chariot to stop, and both of them, Philip and the eunuch, went down into the water, and Philip baptized him.

39 When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord snatched Philip away; the eunuch saw him no more, and went on his way rejoicing.

40 But Philip found himself at Azotus, and as he was passing through the region, he proclaimed the good news to all the towns until he came to Caesarea.

1 John 4.7-end

New Revised Standard Version, Anglicised

7 Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God; everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. 8 Whoever does not love does not know God, for God is love.

9 God's love was revealed among us in this way: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might live through him.10 In this is love, not that we loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins.

11 Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another.

12 No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God lives in us, and his love is perfected in us.

13 By this we know that we abide in him and he in us, because he has given us of his Spirit.

14 And we have seen and do testify that the Father has sent his Son as the Saviour of the world.

15 God abides in those who confess that Jesus is the Son of God, and they abide in God.

16 So we have known and believe the love that God has for us.God is love, and those who abide in love abide in God, and God abides in them.

17 Love has been perfected among us in this: that we may have boldness on the day of judgement, because as he is, so are we in this world.

18 There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear; for fear has to do with punishment, and whoever fears has not reached perfection in love.

19 We love because he first loved us.

20 Those who say, 'I love God', and hate their brothers or sisters, are liars; for those who do not love a brother or sister whom they have seen, cannot love God whom they have not seen.

21 The commandment we have from him is this: those who love God must love their brothers and sisters also.

John 15.1-8

New Revised Standard Version, Anglicised

15 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vine-grower. 2 He removes every branch in me that bears no fruit. Every branch that bears fruit he prunes to make it bear more fruit.

3 You have already been cleansed by the word that I have spoken to you.

4 Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me.

5 I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing.

6 Whoever does not abide in me is thrown away like a branch and withers; such branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned.

7 If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you.

8 My Father is glorified by this, that you bear much fruit and become my disciples.

Iain McKillop Exhibition

Until 20 May – Leicester Cathedral

An Easter exhibition of paintings by acclaimed British artist Iain McKillop, produced through 20 months of near isolation during the Covid-19 pandemic and intended as a memorial to all who were affected by it.

Stations of the Resurrection explores the accounts of witnesses who were convinced of Jesus' return to life following his crucifixion.

A set of over 20 paintings, they are accompanied by the book *Stations of the Resurrection: Encounters with the Risen Christ*, offering reflections on each of these episodes from poet Malcolm Guite and Bishop Guli Francis-Dehqani.

McKillop hopes to make us consider the evidence of the Gospel accounts, the implications of Jesus' resurrection, and what aspects might convince us to trust in God and Christ's teachings today.
