# Reflection: Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> August 2025 Eighth Sunday after Trinity

Genesis 15: 1-6

"We are a covenant people" is a claim made by many protestant churches and following St. Paul's letter to the Galatians, we can be sure that it is to the covenant here in Genesis that they refer. Abram is met by God, and assured of divine favour, but Abram argues that this favour can only be temporary, as he has no heir to succeed him, so his wealth and status transfers to a foreigner on his death, and not to his son. God then promises him not only a son, but that his ancestors through that son would be as numerous as the stars in the sky. Then comes one of the most cited verses in the bible, verse 6, that Abram believed God, and God credited this as righteousness. From this verse Paul was able to point to salvation coming through faith, rather than adherence to law or good works. As Abram through faith became righteous Abraham, so we through faith in the redemptive work of Jesus on the cross also become heirs to God's promise to Abram. Thus says St. Paul we are heirs of the covenant and thus a covenant people.

# Bible Readings: Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> August Eighth Sunday after Trinity

#### Genesis 15.1-6

1 After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.'

2 But Abram said, 'O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?'

3 And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.'

4 But the word of the Lord came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.'

5 He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.'

6 And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

#### Hebrews 11.1-3, 8-16

1 Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

2 Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval.

3 By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

8 By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance; and he set out, not knowing where he was going.

9 By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise.

10 For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

11 By faith he received power of procreation, even though he was too old-and Sarah herself was barrenbecause he considered him faithful who had promised.

12 Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, 'as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore.'

13 All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth,

14 for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland.

15 If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return.
16 But as it is, they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

#### Luke 12.32-40

32 'Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom.

33 Sell your possessions, and give alms. Make purses for yourselves that do not wear out, an unfailing treasure in heaven, where no thief comes near and no moth destroys.

34 For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

35 'Be dressed for action and have your lamps lit; 36 be like those who are waiting for their master to return from the wedding banquet, so that they may open the door for him as soon as he comes and knocks.

37 Blessed are those slaves whom the master finds alert when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them.

38 If he comes during the middle of the night, or near dawn, and finds them so, blessed are those slaves.
39 'But know this: if the owner of the house had known at what hour the thief was coming, he would not have let his house be broken into.

40 You also must be ready, for the Son of Man is coming at an unexpected hour.'

The Foodbank has **MOST URGENT NEED of:**Microwave rice, Corned beef, Tinned peas, Tinned ham,
Tinned rice pudding, Tinned vegetarian meals, such as
veggie chilli, Marmalade.

#### They also need:

Meals that do not need cooking e.g. John West Fish and rice meals, Biscuits, Snacks and cereal bars, Coffee (small jars), Custard, Fruit squash/ juice, Hot dogs (tins or jars), Red meat: mince, stew, Bolognese, chilli, Pasta sauce, Microwave puddings, Pasta sauce, Peanut butter, Chicken in sauce, UHT milk (whole or semi-skimmed), Tinned carrots, Tinned pasta, Dried potatoes (Smash), Crackers, Tinned sweetcorn, Tinned tomatoes, Fray Bentos pies, Sandwich paste, Teabags, Cup of Soup, Tinned potatoes, Tuna, Sugar (500g), Cup of soup, ALPRO yoghurts (long-life,

for the shelf not fridge), Long-life meals, Robinsons minis or similar for families (small squash concentrates), Small cartons of long life milk (for homeless people or someone without a fridge)

# NEW: Revd Richard Trethewey Appointed Archdeacon of Leicester



Richard is well known by many in the diocese for his work as Assistant Archdeacon and Chair of the Diocesan Advisory Committee.

Commenting on the appointment, Bishop Martyn said: "I am particularly pleased that Richard has agreed to become the next Archdeacon of Leicester. His appointment provides continuity at a time of considerable change in the diocese, and I know that he will bring real wisdom and energy to the work of supporting parishes through these changes. Richard has rich parish experience himself, both in this diocese as well as Birmingham and Lichfield. I am looking forward to working with him in this new role." Reflecting on his new role, Richard said: "It is nearly 10 years since I was interviewed to take up a post in the Diocese of Leicester, and in that time a lot has changed for me personally and in the diocese. Over those years I have been privileged to have been able to contribute to the life and mission of the diocese, primarily of course in my parishes of Glenfield and Newtown Linford, then as Area Dean, Chair of the DAC and most recently Assistant Archdeacon. "I am aware that I have a lot to learn as I move from one side of the diocese to the other, but I am looking forward to stepping up to the responsibility and stepping across to the Archdeaconry of Leicester to continue to serve the churches and people of this county and city as we pursue our vision of the Kingdom of God." # NEW: Introducing the Revd Phil Bryson, Diocesan Disability Adviser



As part of our commitment as a diocese to prioritise the inclusion and flourishing of all God's people in our worshipping communities, the Revd Phil Bryson has taken up the position of Diocesan Disability Adviser.

The purpose of this role is to work collaboratively with others in the diocese to enable churches to be welcoming places for people with disabilities and neurodivergence,

and their households, and to support their growth into ministry and leadership.

Revd Phil is visually impaired, and has been since the age of 11. Talking about his experiences and calling to the role, he said: "My experience as a disabled (or as I like to say 'differently abled') person, and as a priest, has given me a particular passion for worship and ministry being accessible to all people, and the value of including differently abled people... Through the role of Diocesan Disability Adviser, I hope that churches can be enabled to be more aware and more accessible of differently abled people and their households both to participate in worship and church life and also to developing their own vocation."

Phil is currently assembling a Disability Advisory Group, which he will chair. This group will have representation of a broader range of disabilities and neurodivergence, bringing together a wide range of knowledge and experience to develop advice and strategy. # Cathedral Civic Service to Mark the 80th Anniversary of VJ Day



A special reflective service will take place at Leicester Cathedral at 5.30pm on Thursday 14th August to mark the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VJ (Victory over Japan) and the end of the Second World War

Held on the eve of the anniversary, the service will offer space for remembrance and reflection on the end of the Second World War, which came just days after the devastating atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Members of the public are invited to attend the service, which invites people to pause and consider the ongoing instability of the world, the continued proliferation of nuclear weapons, and the deep and enduring need for peace.

Lord-Lieutenant of Leicestershire, Mike Kapur OBE CstJ, said: "Marking the 80th anniversary of VJ Day gives us an opportunity to reflect not only on the end of one of the darkest chapters in our history, but also on the sacrifices made by so many, including those from Leicester and Leicestershire. It is vital that we remember the past in order to build a more peaceful future."

The service will include prayers, readings and moments of silence, offering a quiet and powerful tribute to those affected by the war and its aftermath.

Wednesdays: 24 September, 1, 8 and 15 October, 9.30am-1pm – The Cube on Symingtons, Market Harborough.

Training aimed at leaders, paid or voluntary, who work with young people and want to develop how they support young people's mental health and wellbeing.

Training is free but spaces are limited, so we do ask that you only sign up if you can make all 4 dates.
