Remember Remember...

The Anglo-Saxons called November the 'wind monath' because it was the time of the year when the cold winds began to blow. The nights draw in leaving us with shorter and colder days. Sir Walter Scott in his long poem 'Marmion' wrote (1808)

"November's sky is chill and drear,
November's leaf is red and sear" (withered)

The poet T.S. Elliot called it "sombre November"

November is also a time for gathering to remember: the month begins with All Saints Day and follows with services for the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed when we remember loved ones, family and friends who have died.

Not all remembering stays the same

Guy Fawkes Night was also once a national day of remembrance. Originally the day was declared a national holiday by parliamentary decree. Unlike today, and until 1859, all parish churches were required to hold services. The rest of the day was given over to celebrations with bells ringing, canons firing and beer flowing.

Before 1918, the 11th of November was remembered as Martinmas. Famous for his generosity towards a drunken beggar, with whom he shared his cloak, St Martin is the patron saint of beggars, drunkards and the poor. This day was celebrated with great feasts and was also the time of hiring fairs, at which agricultural labourers and farmhands would seek employment.

Nowadays 11th November is remembered with solemnity for those who have given their lives in the service of their country in wars past and present. We remember the courage they showed, but also the cost that they and their loved ones bore; especially those who died or carry the ongoing scars of conflict both physical and mental.

As we remember their sacrifice it points us to the even greater sacrifice of Jesus who gave up his life; not for his friends or those who deserve it, but for a humanity that had turned its back on God and plunged his good world into conflict and chaos. Such is God's love that he looks on us with all our mistakes and failings and doesn't give up on us. But in love gives up his own life, so that we can be at peace with him now and forever. In the face of such love how can our hearts not be warmed and our

desire be to loved as he loved us. Lest we forget...

Stir up, we beseech thee, O Lord, the wills of thy faithful people; that they, plenteously bringing forth the fruit of good works, may of thee be plenteously rewarded; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
