# Reflection: Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2025 First Sunday after Trinity

## 1 Kings 19: 1-15

Have you ever had a huge triumph in your life and then straight after run into some problem that has 'floored' you completely. If you have then this story of Elijah probably resonates with you. Having won a mighty victory for God over the followers of Baal a Canaanite fertility God that had become popular in Israel, Elijah is immediately threatened with death by Jezebel the archetypal wicked queen and a power force behind her wicked and rather weak husband King Ahab. Victory forgotten, Elijah runs to the desert, where like Jonah he sits under a tree wishing to die, then he goes to sleep. God sends an angel to feed him, let him sleep, then feed him again. This shows God's care for Elijah's physical needs as well as his spiritual ones. This is a message to all Christian leaders and workers to look after themselves mentally and physically to avoid burnout. Only when Elijah was refreshed did he move on to Horeb, where God dealt with his spiritual problems. When God asks why Elijah is there, Elijah states that he is the only person left who works for God. This is not true there are 7,000 others in Israel (Verse 18), but God wants to show Elijah that although God can work in the

miraculous represented in the Wind, Earthquake and Fire, God can also work in the quiet and the normal still small voice. It is in the normal and every day, that God more often speaks. Then God gently sets Elijah back to work again for him, renewed in body, mind and spirit. In Launde Minster community with all the demands and the lack of resources, it is easy for us to become like Elijah, burnt out and depressed. This story is given us to remind us that God cares for our whole life and being not just for what we can do for Him.

# Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> June First Sunday after Trinity

#### Isaiah 65.1-9

1 I was ready to be sought out by those who did not ask, to be found by those who did not seek me. I said,

'Here I am, here I am',

to a nation that did not call on my name.

2 I held out my hands all day long

to a rebellious people, who walk in a way that is not good,

following their own devices;

- 3 a people who provoke me
  to my face continually, sacrificing in gardens
  and offering incense on bricks;
- 4 who sit inside tombs,

and spend the night in secret places; who eat swine's flesh,

with broth of abominable things in their vessels;

5 who say, 'Keep to yourself,

do not come near me, for I am too holy for you.' These are a smoke in my nostrils,

a fire that burns all day long.

6 See, it is written before me:

I will not keep silent, but I will repay; I will indeed repay into their laps

7 their iniquities and their ancestors' iniquities together, says the Lord ; because they offered incense on the mountains

and reviled me on the hills, I will measure into their laps

full payment for their actions.

8 Thus says the Lord : As the wine is found in the cluster,

and they say, 'Do not destroy it,

for there is a blessing in it', so I will do for my servants' sake,

and not destroy them all.

9 I will bring forth descendants from Jacob, and from Judah inheritors of my mountains; my

chosen shall inherit it,

and my servants shall settle there.

## Galatians 3.23-end

23 Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed.

24 Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith.

25 But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian,

26 for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith.

27 As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ.

28 There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus.

29 And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

#### Luke 8.26-39

26 Then they arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee.

27 As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. 28 When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me'-

29 for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.)

30 Jesus then asked him, 'What is your name?' He said, 'Legion'; for many demons had entered him.

31 They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss.

32 Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission.

33 Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.

34 When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country.

35 Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid.

36 Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed.

37 Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned.

38 The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying,

39 'Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you.' So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

## **Teas in Gaulby Church**






Join us <u>every Saturday</u> until mid-September in Gaulby church for a cream tea, homemade cake, or just a cup of tea or coffee.

# Journeying with the Psalms through Life's Ups and Downs

St Dionysius traditionally makes much of their choir at services such as Nine Lessons & Carols, and their Easter Vigil, but saw an opportunity to create an event for the summer.

"I have often been struck by the honesty of the psalms and how they bring voice to both the ups and downs of life." explains Revd Phil. "The idea developed for a service that journeys through the different forms of psalms. I thought it could be a powerful act of gathered worship and provide an opportunity for the special involvement of the choir." Revd Phil worked with Pam Abbott, the choir coordinator and Jane Holyland, one of their organists, to set out a journey through the psalms that marks different tones; those that cry out in lament, those that are reflective, and those that are joyous – including an acclamation of God as creator of the world.

"Although the psalms are ancient texts, and the specific contexts in which they were written vary from our own contexts, there is nevertheless a commonality that resonates," says Revd Phil. "The sense of crying out to God in the midst of personal struggles and at the injustices in the world around is relevant today, and indeed throughout history. Similarly, the more joyous notes of thanksgiving and exultation are relatable even if the specific context is different."

The team are hopeful that through the readings, liturgy, music and silence there will be space for people to come to God with whatever is going on in their lives and the wider world.
