Reflection: Sunday 16th March 2025 Second Sunday of Lent

Jesus is a controversial figure. This week's gospel shows the backdrop of tension 2000 years ago between freedom to practise faith and necessary allegiance to the Roman occupying forces. There were huge inequalities in the society of the time and anyone offering the possibility of change presented hope to the general population but a threat to both the ruling class and the Roman occupiers.

As Jesus' following grew, so did the anxiety that his preaching might inflame passions and alter the delicate balance, thus upsetting the status quo. So, was the Pharisees' warning to Jesus out of genuine concern for his welfare, or did they feel that it was a challenge to their authority, which might cause civil unrest? Or, maybe, was this one of the 'opportune moments', mentioned in last week's gospel, for the devil to tempt Jesus to walk away from his calling?

Jesus, however, was clear about his purpose – while he lived, he proclaimed the kingdom of God and he had not yet fulfilled all that he came to do.

There is nothing new. Two thousand years of 'progress' haven't really altered the challenges that face us.

This week, can we pray for women and men of courage in our own times? We pray that when faced with similar challenges (is the offer on the table made out of concern for the welfare of the people, for the convenience of leading factions, or to maintain the status quo between external forces), they will make the right decisions. We pray for them to have courage, determination, compassion, hope and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Our world is often hostile or indifferent to the message of Jesus. God has deep love for His people. May we all rise to the challenge of living out this mission with courage, compassion, and hope.

Bible Readings: Sunday 16th March 2025 Second Sunday of Lent

Genesis 15.1-12, 17-18

15 After these things the word of the Lord came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.'

2 But Abram said, 'O Lord God, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?'

3 And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.'

4 But the word of the Lord came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.'

5 He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.'

6 And he believed the Lord; and the Lord reckoned it to him as righteousness.

7 Then he said to him, 'I am the Lord who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess.'

8 But he said, 'O Lord God, how am I to know that I shall possess it?'

9 He said to him, 'Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtle-dove, and a young pigeon.'

10 He brought him all these and cut them in two, laying each half over against the other; but he did not cut the birds in two.

11 And when birds of prey came down on the carcasses, Abram drove them away.

12 As the sun was going down, a deep sleep fell upon Abram, and a deep and terrifying darkness descended upon him.

17 When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire-pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces.

18 On that day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, 'To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates,

Philippians 3.17-4.1

17 Brothers and sisters, join in imitating me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us.
18 For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears.

19 Their end is destruction; their god is the belly; and their glory is in their shame; their minds are set on earthly things.

20 But our citizenship is in heaven, and it is from there that we are expecting a Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ.
21 He will transform the body of our humiliation so that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the

power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself.

4 1 Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

Luke 13.31-end

31 At that very hour some Pharisees came and said to him, 'Get away from here, for Herod wants to kill you.'
32 He said to them, 'Go and tell that fox for me, "Listen, I am casting out demons and performing cures today and tomorrow, and on the third day I finish my work.

33 Yet today, tomorrow, and the next day I must be on my way, because it is impossible for a prophet to be killed away from Jerusalem."

34 Jerusalem, Jerusalem, the city that kills the prophets and stones those who are sent to it! How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!

35 See, your house is left to you. And I tell you, you will not see me until the time comes when you say, "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."

Bishop Martyn Calls for an Intercultural Approach To LLF

As lead bishop for the Living in Love and Faith (LLF) process, Bishop Martyn has released a new booklet entitled: 'Can We Imagine a Future Together? Intercultural lessons for Living in Love and Faith'.

In this literature, he asks those on different sides of the LLF debate whether they want to remain together as one church, and how that might be possible.

He hopes that by applying an intercultural approach to our profound differences, we might be able to navigate a new path in our LLF journey.

Bishop Martyn said: "Despite the great depths in our disagreements over Living in Love and Faith, I believe there is still a longing for unity among most of us in the Church of England...

"Far from attempting to offer a quick fix solution, this book explores how we might imagine a new future together and maintain unity across a variety of theological differences." Penny is leading a webinar to talk more on this research, exploring themes around the challenges of living with a hidden disability. She will suggest ways that churches could engage positively with this theme to improve accessibility, and she will

Stations of the Cross at Leicester Cathedral



Exhibition: Stations of the Cross until 21st April

The Stations of the Cross are an ever-evolving form of devotion and contemplation in the Christian tradition. They form a narration of the final hours of the life of Jesus Christ on earth. Originating in Jerusalem, as Pilgrims arrived wanting to follow Jesus' journey, the practice was brought home to those unable to visit the Holy Land.

Different Christian traditions have included different stations; scriptural, imaginative or educational, all designed to bring us closer to the person of Jesus, the path he trod, the effect this wrought on those closest to him and on those he encountered for the first/only time.

Artist Mark Cazalet has painted images on Bread boards (Jesus being the Bread of Life), in dialogue with devotional poems and prompts from Richard Leaf, for pilgrims treading the path themselves. We invite you to follow the journey here at Leicester Cathedral and explore The Stations of the Cross for yourself. The stations of the cross can be seen with free admission during the Cathedral's opening hours.

Launching the Bishop's Lent appeal 2025 – The Leprosy Mission

The Bishops' Lent Appeal for 2025 is in support of The Leprosy Mission, a Christian charity who work to

provide healing and hope to those affected by leprosy.

Every two minutes, someone is diagnosed with leprosy. Although it is curable, millions of people worldwide are living with the effects of the disease, from physical disability to mental health problems, poverty and discrimination. Caring for those with leprosy is a cause close to the heart of the Bishop of Loughborough, Rt Revd Saju Muthalaly, and a cause which has historical roots in Leicestershire.

Bishop Saju recently visited the village of Burton Lazars and the site of what was an historic administrative centre for the care of leprosy across the nation.

He also stopped by St James' Church, which is home to 'Roger', a carved stone leper head, and one of just a few preserved relics from this time.

Here, he was taken back to his days growing up in a leprosy hospital in Bengaluru where his mother served as a nurse and, in this video, speaks about that time and the plight of The Leprosy Mission in Sri Lanka today.
